More than 6.5 million people visit the "Wies'n" – as locals call the 195-year old tradition – every year, drink more than 1.6 million gallons of beer and eat almost 500,000 chickens during the two weeks of the event.

You may have visited the Oktoberfest yourself or one of the many re-celebrations here in the U.S., known as "Octoberfests." But there is much more to the fest than many of us may imagine: We are honored to have as our

speaker Wolfgang Gruener, who was born and raised in Munich and today is employed as managing editor of one of the most influential computer industry publications in North America. He will guide us through the widely unknown origins of the Oktoberfest and shed some light on mysterious traditions, including the lederhosen & dirndl, beer tents & fish rolls, polka music, Bavarian Gemütlichkeit, and others.
