Norway's 10 Weirdest Traditions Torske Klub Newsletter Dec. 2019

Many of us have grown up with the Christmas traditions of our immigrant ancestors from Europe and elsewhere. For mine, it is memories of baking julekake, krumkake, sandbakkels and lefse. It is the smell of pine and potpourri of the season, including the gløgg. Has anyone else thought it weird that many families will relish the lutefisk as well? Well, it ends up there is more weirdness than just that tradition; many adopted in recent decades after our ancestors were long gone. Here are some of Norway's weirder traditions for Christmas.



Marzipan Pigs—An almond dropped into rice porridge (*risgrat*) for the children to retrieve. The first one gets a treat in form of a marzipan shaped into a pig.

Disney Cartoons—I suppose a Chicagoan baby boomer can relate to this as they watch "Suzy Snowflake" or "Frosty the Snowman" on WGN, but Norway has binged on ten specific Disney Cartoons since 1953; specifically shown on Christmas Day at 3pm.

Smuggling— Norwegians stock up in Sweden on liquor and other items that have a lower tax or availability (especially butter). Why is butter in demand? Read on...

Julekjeks— The pre Christmas bake goes to such excess that butter shortages occur in December and one has to go to Sweden to smuggle butter back for baking (see above).

Trick-or-treating—Called går julebukk, it is the practice of children dressing up, traveling from house to house, and singing while begging for treats. Adults may go too, but often don't always last long on the trip as they get a shot of aquavit for their efforts.

Ribs—Norwegians eat ribs instead of roasts for Christmas, preferring pork (*julribbe*) or lamb (*pinnekjøtt*) ribs. Personally, I find this MUCH less weird than the lutefisk which Norwegian-Americans crave.

Dancing around the tree— This seems more traditional & less odd until you consider that most dance from songs from *God Jul*, the 1967 album by Norwegian show band *Dizzie Tu*nes.

Tre Nøtter til Askepott—This is an East German adventure film from the 1970s watched on TV by most. It loosely translates to "Three Hazelnuts for Cinderella". The American equivalent may be the Charlie Brown Christmas Special or Christmas Story in the USA.



Julenissen—Santa Claus turns up as a parent or uncle in a cheesy beard or heavy coat. Few kids are deceived.

Feeding the *nisse*– The *nisse* are gnome-like guardians in the barns. They get bribed with rice porridge (risgrøt) with a big dab of butter on top. It is a much more serious matter than leaving milk/cookies or a drink for
